Expecting the Unexpected Future

- We're looking into a new year that, as always, is full of unknowns. Politics, war, revolution, science, medicine, culture, economy, creativity, racial tensions, justice, decline, renewal.
- A basic challenge of life is dealing with time. Our faith is very present-oriented. We are called to love and serve here and now. *"I was hungry and you fed me..."* (Mt 25:35) *"Do not be anxious about tomorrow..."* (Mt 6:34). I want to live this moment as a child of God, a follower of Jesus, and trust God for the future. Leave it in his capable hands.
- But being able to do that depends on trusting who God is. Often we face situations that challenge that trust. Why is this happening? Broken family, betrayal, my own failure, sickness, death, prayer that gets no response from God, struggles with temptation.
- The Advent texts from Isaiah 7, 9, & 11 that we've been reflecting on this year are all set in times of deep uncertainty and brokenness in the faith of God's people. Things were not going well and would get worse, Isaiah announced. But even at their worst, there could and would be times of grace and blessing. And through it all God was present working both short-term and long-term with his people for their good, by his creative power. *"To us a child is born…"* (Is 9:6); *"A shoot from the stump of Jesse…"* (Is 11 1). The king might be corrupt, sold out to Assyria, but God works toward an unfolding future for us.

God's Surprising Grace Unfolding

- Isaiah 40 comes generations down the line, nearly 200 yrs later, 540's b.c. Destruction of Jerusalem, exile, all have happened. Judgment, transformation. Broken hopes, new hope. A new Isaiah says God is with us right now, working with us into the unfolding future.
- The intervention he promises shapes the hope and the direction with which we work today. Encouragement for Israel (1-2); God's glory revealed for all nations (3-5). Yes we are vulnerable & passing, but we participate in God's eternal work (6-8). God's mighty arm gathers us in his loving embrace (9-11). God has not given us up. His future begins now.
- The understanding of the God of the future who shapes our lives and actions now is basic for the last half of Isaiah and lays the groundwork for Jesus' ministry and our faith. Isaiah knows the language of God's power and glory and how that was abused for national and personal glory in Israel's history. The image of God's mighty arm to strike down the enemy, was powerful. Here, "Behold your God!" reveals a tender shepherd.
- In Isaiah 52-53, he celebrates good news of God revealing his Kingdom (as Jesus did). He bares his arm, shows his salvation, returns to Zion in glory. But the character of that might and glory, the arm of Yahweh, is seen in the mysterious role of the suffering servant who bears our griefs and heals with his wounds. What an astonishing God! An astonishing story! It was the promise of a grace that would shape all of God's future. It ultimately transforms the concept of glory, love, and service, embodied in Jesus.

Finding Myself in the Work of God

- Jesus knew that that God is the true God to whom the whole world belongs. He wooed his disciples toward him, invaded their imagination with stories and deeds, showed them God's reality in death and resurrection. Paul and others were captured by that reality.
- We, like Paul, know our limitations of time and strength. But the call of God we hear in Jesus is real. This year challenges us to follow that call now into our unfolding future.
