# **Discerning Gifts for Spiritual Growth**

### 1 Peter 5:1-7

<sup>1</sup>I am urging the **elders** (*presbyteros*) among you, as a **fellow-elder** and a **witness** of the sufferings of the Messiah, and as one who shares with you in the glory that's going to be revealed: <sup>2</sup> Do the work of a **shepherd** (*poimainein*) as you **watch over/oversee** (*episkopein*) God's **flock** that's among you, not under compulsion, but **gladly**, as before God; not for shameful profit, but **eagerly**. <sup>3</sup> Don't act as though you were lords over those for whom you're responsible, but be **models** for the **flock**. <sup>4</sup> And when the **chief shepherd** appears, you will receive the unfading crown of glory.

<sup>5</sup> Likewise, the **younger** people: Be subject to **elders**/older people. But all of you clothe yourselves with humility of thought toward one another, because *"God opposes the proud but gives grace to the humble."* (Prov. 3:34; Jam. 4:6) <sup>6</sup> Humble yourselves, therefore, under God's powerful hand in order that he may lift you up at the proper time, <sup>7</sup> while you cast every anxiety on him, because he cares for you.

#### Mark 10:42-45

<sup>42</sup> And Jesus called his disciples to him and said to them, "You know that those who are considered rulers of the nations <u>lord it over them</u>, and their great ones <u>exercise authority</u> over them. <sup>43</sup> But <u>it shall</u> <u>not be so among you</u>. But whoever would be great among you will be your <u>servant</u> (*diakonos*), <sup>44</sup> and whoever would be first among you will be <u>slave</u> (*doulos*) <u>of all</u>. <sup>45</sup> For even <u>the Son of Man did not come</u> <u>to be served but to serve</u> (*diakonein*), <u>and to give his life as a ransom for many</u>."

#### Acts 20:28-35 Paul speaks to the elders from the church at Ephesus

<sup>28</sup> Pay attention to yourselves and to the whole <u>flock</u>, in which <u>the Holy Spirit</u> has set you as <u>overseers/guardians</u> (*episkopos*), to <u>shepherd</u> (*poimainein*) the church of God, which <u>he obtained with his own blood</u>.
<sup>29</sup> I know that after I depart fierce <u>wolves</u> will enter in among you, who won't spare the <u>flock</u>. <sup>30</sup> Even from <u>your own selves</u> will arise those who speak distorted things to draw away the disciples after them.
<sup>31</sup> Therefore <u>keep watch</u>, and remember that for three years night and day I did not cease admonishing each one of you with tears.

<sup>32</sup> And now <u>I entrust you to God</u> and to <u>the message of his grace</u>, which has <u>power</u> to <u>build you up</u> and to grant the <u>inheritance</u> among all those whom God has made holy.

<sup>33</sup> I coveted no one's silver or gold or clothing. <sup>34</sup> You yourselves know that these very hands worked as servants for my necessities and for those who were with me. <sup>35</sup> In all things I have shown you that by <u>working strenuously</u> (*kopian*) in this way we must help those who are weak and remember the words of the Lord Jesus, how he himself said, *"It is more blessed to give than to receive."* 

#### Hebrews 13:7-8, 16-17

<sup>7</sup>Keep in mind <u>your leaders</u>, who <u>spoke the word of God to you</u>. As you consider the full course of their way of life, <u>imitate their faith</u>. <sup>8</sup> Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever.

<sup>16</sup> Do not neglect doing good and sharing together, for such sacrifices are pleasing to God. <sup>17</sup> Have <u>confidence</u> in those who <u>lead</u> you and <u>defer</u> to them, for they themselves are <u>keeping watch</u> for your lives / souls as those who will <u>give an account</u>. Let them do this with joy and not groaning, for that would be of no benefit to you.

#### Ephesians 4:11-13

<sup>11</sup> And Jesus himself gave these gifts: the emissaries, the proclaimers of encouragement and upbuilding, the announcers of good news, the shepherds (poimen) and teachers, <sup>12</sup> for the process of equipping the

holy people for work of service (*diakonia*), for building up the body of the Messiah, <sup>13</sup> until <u>we all</u> arrive at the goal of the <u>oneness</u> both of the <u>faith</u> and of the <u>knowledge of the Son of God</u>, to <u>mature</u> <u>adulthood</u>, to <u>a maturity defined by the fullness of the Messiah</u>.

### 1 Timothy 5:17-18

<sup>17</sup> Let <u>elders</u> (*presbyteros*) who are good <u>stewards</u> / leaders be counted worthy of double honor, especially those who <u>work strenuously in word and teaching</u>. <sup>18</sup> For the scripture says, *"Don't muzzle an ox while it's threshing grain,"* (Deut 25:4; 1Cor 9:9) and, *"The worker deserves his wages"* (Luke 10:7).

## A Community Process of Discernment

- We've come to an important time in the process of adding to our leadership. A church is a part of the body of Christ. We exist to help each other and the people around us <u>know the God of</u> <u>the universe</u> who shows himself in <u>Jesus</u> and lives in us in his <u>Holy Spirit</u>. That affects every aspect of life, but its <u>priority is important</u>. We want to discern, <u>participate in God's work</u>.
- We know from our world how cynically leadership is manipulated. Across history, the church is often no different, just another broken human institution. The process of <u>discernment</u> matters for those who believe/trust in God with <u>renewed minds</u> (Rm 12:1-2). There's no set method or failsafe technique. We do our best. God works. The Holy Spirit acts among us. Always <u>the challenge of Jesus</u> shows us <u>God's reality</u> turning our world's values upside down. We must go back again and again to the <u>scriptures</u> as <u>learners</u>, looking at <u>Jesus</u>, growing.

# Maturity, Task, Responsibility

- In the early church several ideas came together to help shape leadership: (1) <u>maturity</u> / elder /older; (2) the metaphor of <u>shepherd</u> growing from Jesus' as the good shepherd; (3) the challenge to be <u>watchful</u>, <u>oversee</u> the community so that the Gospel is not distorted.
- <u>Peter</u> urges <u>elders</u> to work like <u>shepherds</u> who <u>watch over</u> the flock gladly no compulsion, ulterior motives, self-aggrandizement, but desiring to set an example, the Gospel's stamp.
- <u>Paul</u> brings together the same ideas as he says farewell to a group of <u>elders</u>, calling them to <u>shepherd</u> and <u>watch</u> for the whole flock. But with a sense of danger wolves. If they are not shaped by the Gospel, they themselves may become wolves. It is not the people who lead who are the standard but <u>God's message of grace in Jesus</u>. Leaders strive always to learn that reality, to <u>embody that message</u> and teach it and <u>avoid distortions</u>. But they must also be evaluated by the message. The community thrives as it is shaped by that message.
- In all of these there is <u>great seriousness</u>: <u>Peter</u>: "God's flock," "chief shepherd." <u>Paul</u>: "Holy Spirit," "his own blood," the "power" of the message. <u>Hebrews</u>: "keeping watch for lives," "give an account." <u>1Tim 5</u>: elders who are "stewards" and "work strenuously in word and teaching."

## A Community that Grows toward Jesus

- Ultimately, this whole process and how lovingly, joyfully, hopefully and responsibly we take it is a statement of <u>who we are</u>. We are becoming people who think, see reality, starting from the event of <u>Jesus</u>. He became one of us and <u>gave these gifts</u> for a <u>transforming process</u>. We're never very good at the process, but it really matters to us and that shapes everything else.
- There are <u>shepherds</u> so we can be shaped by Jesus, serving, becoming the body of the Messiah. The aim is for us to grow into the maturity, the serving, the loving, the self-giving, the understanding, the oneness, the beauty and creativity of Jesus, the fullness of God in him.
