# The Lord's Servant and Light for the World

Isaiah 42:1-10 (God speaks of His Servant: with God's Spirit, gentle, persistent, just, for all people)

<sup>1</sup> Behold my servant, whom I uphold, my chosen, in whom my soul is pleased; I have given my Spirit to be upon him;

he will bring forth **justice** to the nations.

<sup>2</sup> He will not cry aloud or lift up his voice, or make his voice heard in the street;
<sup>3</sup> a bruised reed he will not break, and a faintly burning wick he will not guench.

For truth he will bring forth **justice**.

<sup>4</sup> He will not grow faint or be crushed till he has established justice in the earth; and for his law the coastlands wait. [Mt 12:18-21]

<sup>5</sup> Thus says God, Yahweh, who created the heavens and stretched them out, who spread out the earth and what comes from it, who gives breath to the people on it and spirit to those who walk in it: <sup>6</sup> "I am Yahweh; I have called you in righteousness; I will take you by the hand and keep you;

I will give you as a **covenant** for the people, a light for the nations,

<sup>7</sup> to open the eyes that are blind,
 to bring out the prisoners from the dungeon,
 from the prison those who sit in darkness.

8 I am Yahweh; that is my name; my glory I give to no other, nor my praise to carved idols.

<sup>9</sup> Behold, the **first things** have come to pass, and **new things** I now declare; before they spring forth I tell you of them."

<sup>10</sup> Sing to Yahweh a new song, his praise from the end of the earth, you who go down to the sea, and all that fills it, the coastlands and their inhabitants.

Isaiah 49:1-6 (The Servant tells of his Call, but is discouraged. God calls the Servant to wider service.)

<sup>1</sup> Listen to me, O coastlands, and give attention, you peoples from afar. <u>Yahweh called me</u> from the womb, from the body of my mother he named my name.

<sup>2</sup> He made my mouth like a <u>sharp sword</u>; in the shadow of his hand he hid me; he made me a polished <u>arrow</u>;

in his quiver he hid me away.

<sup>3</sup> And he said to me, "<u>You are my servant,</u> <u>Israel</u>, in whom I will be glorified."

<sup>4</sup> But I said, <u>"I have labored in vain;</u> I spent my might for emptiness and vapor; yet surely <u>my justice is with Yahweh</u>, and my recompense with my God."

<sup>5</sup> And <u>now Yahweh speaks</u>, he who formed me from the womb as a servant for him,

to turn <u>Jacob</u> back to him; and that <u>Israel</u> might be gathered to him – for I will be honored in the <u>eyes of Yahweh</u>, and my God is my strength.

- <sup>6</sup> He says: "It is <u>too small</u> a thing for you only to be my servant to raise up the tribes of Jacob and to restore the survivors of Israel;
- I will also give you as <u>a light for the nations</u>, that <u>my salvation</u> may reach to the <u>end of the earth</u>."

### Isaiah 50:4-9 (Servant speaks: God taught him to hear and speak in the face of opposition, helped by God)

<sup>4</sup> My Lord Yahweh has given me the speaking ability of those who are <u>well instructed</u>, that I may know how to help the faint with a word. Morning by morning he <u>awakens my ear</u> to <u>listen</u> as those who are <u>well instructed</u> do.

- <sup>5</sup> My Lord Yahweh has <u>opened my ear</u>, and I did not disobey; I did not turn my back.
- <sup>6</sup> I gave my back to <u>those who strike</u>, my cheeks to those who pull out the beard; I did not hide my face from <u>insult and spitting</u>.

<sup>7</sup> But <u>my Lord Yahweh is my advocate;</u> therefore I have not been disgraced; therefore I have set my face like a flint, and I know that I shall not be put to shame.

- <sup>8</sup> <u>He who vindicates me is near</u>. Who will contend with me? Let us stand up together. Who is my adversary? Let him come near to me.
- <sup>9</sup> Behold, <u>my Lord Yahweh is my advocate</u>; who will declare me guilty? [Rom 8:33-34]
   Behold, all of them will wear out like a garment; the moth will eat them up.

#### Isaiah 41:8-10

<sup>8</sup> But you, <u>Israel</u>, my <u>servant</u>, <u>Jacob</u>, whom I have <u>chosen</u>, the offspring of Abraham, my friend; <sup>9</sup> you whom I took from the <u>ends of the earth</u>, and <u>called</u> from its farthest corners, saying to you, "<u>You are my servant</u>, I have <u>chosen</u> you and not cast you off; <sup>10</sup> fear not, for <u>I am with you</u>; be not dismayed, for I am your God; I will strengthen you, I will be your advocate...."

#### Isaiah 42:18-20

<sup>18</sup> <u>Hear</u>, you <u>deaf</u>, | and <u>look</u>, you <u>blind</u>, that you may see! | <sup>19</sup> <u>Who is blind but my servant</u>, or <u>deaf</u> as my messenger whom I send? | Who is blind as my dedicated one, | or blind as <u>the servant of Yahweh</u>? | <sup>20</sup> He <u>sees</u> many things, but does not <u>observe</u> them; | his <u>ears</u> are open, but he does <u>not hear</u>...."

#### Matthew 12:15-24

<sup>15</sup> Jesus, aware of this [the Pharisees' plans against him], withdrew from there. And <u>many followed</u> him, and he <u>healed</u> them all <sup>16</sup> and ordered them not to make him known. <sup>17</sup> This was to fill up what was spoken by the prophet Isaiah:

<sup>18</sup> "Behold, my servant whom I have chosen,

nor will anyone hear his voice in the streets:

my <u>beloved</u> with whom my soul is well pleased.

I will put my Spirit upon him,

- and he will proclaim justice to the <u>Gentiles</u>.
- <sup>19</sup> He will not quarrel or cry aloud,

 <sup>20</sup> a bruised reed he will not break, and a smoldering wick he will not quench, until he brings justice to victory; ...

<sup>21</sup> and in his name the Gentiles will hope." [Isa. 42:1-4 Heb&Gk]

<sup>22</sup> Then a demon-oppressed man who was <u>blind</u> and <u>mute</u> was brought to him, and he <u>healed</u> him, so that the man spoke and saw. <sup>23</sup> And all the people were amazed, and said, "Can this be the <u>Son of David</u>?" <sup>24</sup> But when the Pharisees heard it, they said, "It is only by <u>Beelzebul</u>, the prince of demons, that this man casts out demons."

### Isaiah, Exile, and a New Vision for Israel and the World

- We're focusing on <u>Isa 40-55</u>, but in scripture it is part of a large book spanning centuries. Israel as independent kingdom protected by God. Jeremiah, that's past, God's judgment by Babylon. Now a people in exile, looking forward to Cyrus of Persia, God's chosen agent for this moment.
- Who are we? What is happening, coming? <u>Son of David</u> bearing God's Spirit (Is 11:1-2, 61:1-2). <u>Son of Man</u> = saints of the Most High receive kingdom but suffer defeat (Dan 7:13-14, 18-22)
- <u>Servant of Yahweh</u> in Isa becomes a central focus for revelation, reflection, anticipation of the new. The <u>Servant is Israel</u> as a whole (Is 41), object of God's pleasure, receives <u>God's Spirit</u>. How? No longer a warring nation but healing, caring servant, uncrushed, bringing justice to nations. How?
- Vision of <u>God</u>: <u>Creator</u> of earth and all people. Servant is God's agent for covenant, <u>new creation</u>: <u>Light to the nations</u>. Healing blindness, prisoners in darkness. This is God's glory, true God, not idols. New Event brings a New Song <u>from ends of the earth</u>. All peoples are called to the One God.

## The Servant Sings to the World: Is 49:1-6; 50:4-9

- Israel as servant is a challenge. Israel has been <u>blind and deaf</u>. That brought <u>exile</u>. Israel needs salvation, renewal. <u>Servant sings with new voice</u>: Called from birth, hidden as God's instrument for his glory. Did not grasp God's glory. God gives the Servant a <u>double mission</u>: <u>to Israel</u> to turn Israel around and restore the people (?). <u>To the nations</u> to be God's light to turn Gentiles to the one God, salvation for all people. Servant is both the embodiment of Israel and the <u>renewer of Israel</u>. He is to bring the truth of Israel's God to the <u>whole of God's creation</u>.
- The servant is instructed by God, aided to listen. He learns not to disobey. But <u>obedience</u> brings <u>pain</u> and <u>insult</u>. He must trust God as his justice. God is the one who lasts, overcomes defeat and guilt. God is the helper/advocate of the Servant, but on a scale that was hard for people to see.
- <u>Jesus</u> brings together <u>Son of David</u>, <u>Son of Man</u> (royal, triumphant figures) with the <u>Servant of</u> <u>Yahweh</u>. No warrior king, rather a healer. A <u>New thing</u> breaking in. Can you see, hear? People knew how to demonize or follow a king. But the Servant was / is a challenge to see God's glory.
