Good News and Boundaries of Belonging

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Acts 8:26-39 Translation TR

²⁶ Now an **angel of the Lord** said to Philip, "*Go toward the south to the road from Jerusalem to Gaza"* – a desert place. ²⁷ When he went, he saw an **Ethiopian**, a **eunuch**, a court official of Candace, queen of the Ethiopians. He was over all her treasury. He had come to **Jerusalem** to **worship** ²⁸ and was returning, seated in his chariot, reading aloud the prophet **Isaiah**.

²⁹ **The Spirit** told Philip, "Go over and join this chariot." ³⁰ When Philip ran up, he heard the man reading Isaiah and asked, "Do you **understand** what you are reading?"

^{3¹} He answered, "How could I, unless someone guides me?" So he invited Philip to come sit with him. ^{3²} Now the Scripture passage he was reading was this:

"Like a **sheep**, he was led to **slaughter**

and as a lamb is silent before its shearer, so he doesn't open his mouth.

³³ In his **humiliation** justice was denied him.

Who can describe his generation? For his life is taken away from the earth." [Isa. 53:7-8]

- ³⁴ The eunuch asked Philip, "Who's the prophet talking about, himself or someone else?"
- ³⁵ So starting from this Scripture, Philip told him **the good news of Jesus**. ³⁶ And as they were going along the road they came to some water, and the eunuch said, "Look, here's water! What's to stop me from being baptized?"
- ³⁸ And he ordered his chariot to stop, and both went down into the water, **Philip and the eunuch**, and he **baptized** him.
- ³⁹ But when they walked up out of the water, the Lord's Spirit took Philip away, and the eunuch never saw him again, for he proceeded on his journey full of joy.

Acts 8:4-6, 8, 12, 14-17 Translation TR Good New for Samaritans

⁴ Now the believers who were scattered (by persecution) went about <u>proclaiming the message as good news</u>. ⁵ When Philip went to the city of <u>Samaria</u>, he proclaimed to them the <u>Anointed King</u> (*Christos*). ⁶ The crowds paid careful attention to what Philip said as they listened and saw the signs that he did.... ⁸ And <u>great joy</u> broke out in that city. ...

¹² And when they believed Philip as he preached <u>good news</u> about the <u>kingdom of God</u> and the name of <u>Jesus Anointed King</u>, both <u>men</u> and <u>women</u> were being <u>baptized</u>....

¹⁴ Now when the <u>apostles in Jerusalem</u> heard that <u>Samaria had received God's message</u>, they sent <u>Peter</u> and <u>John</u> to them. ¹⁵ When they arrived, they prayed for them to <u>receive the Holy Spirit</u>, ¹⁶ for the <u>Spirit</u> had not yet fallen on any of them, but they were just baptized into the name of the Lord Jesus. ¹⁷ Then they started laying hands on them and they began <u>receiving the Holy Spirit</u>.

Isaiah 56:3-7 Translation TR Good New for Foreigners and Outcasts

³ Don't let the <u>foreigner</u> joined to Yahweh say, "Yahweh will surely <u>separate me</u> from his people"; and don't let the <u>eunuch</u> say, "I'm just a dry tree." ⁴ For Yahweh says: <u>To the eunuchs</u> who ... hold fast my covenant, ⁵ I'll give them, <u>in my house</u> ... <u>a monument and a name</u> better than sons and daughters. ... ⁶ And the <u>foreigners</u> who join themselves to Yahweh, ... ⁷ I'll bring them to <u>my holy mountain</u>, and make them joyful in my house of prayer; ... for <u>my house shall be called a house of prayer for all peoples</u>.

¹No eunuch shall be admitted to the assembly of Yahweh. ... ³ No foreign Ammonite or Moabite shall be admitted to the assembly of Yahweh even to the tenth generation

²And I'll make of you a <u>great nation</u>, and I'll bless you and make your name great, so that you will be a <u>blessing</u>. ³ ... and <u>in you all the families of the earth will be blessed</u>.

Galatians 3:25-29 Translation TR Jesus' Faithfulness Changes Everything

²⁵ But now that Jesus' faithfulness has come, we're no longer under a guardian, ²⁶ for you're all children of God through the <u>faithfulness in Messiah Jesus</u>.

²⁷ Every one of you who was <u>baptized</u> into the Messiah <u>clothed yourself with the Messiah</u>.
²⁸ There's neither <u>Jew</u> nor <u>Greek</u>, there's neither <u>slave</u> nor <u>free</u>, there's no <u>male</u> and <u>female</u>; for you're all <u>one</u> in <u>Messiah Jesus</u>.
²⁹ And if you're <u>part of the Messiah</u>, you're also <u>Abraham's family</u>, heirs of everything in the <u>promise</u>.

The Spirit's Surprise in the Spreading Good News

- <u>Jesus</u> sent the <u>Apostles</u> out to make disciples of <u>all nations</u> (Mt 28:18-20). On Pentecost, <u>Jews from many nations</u>/languages were gathered in Jerusalem when <u>the Spirit came</u>. Acts unfolds the story as these diverse Jews respond, and God creates <u>new community</u>.
- But there's <u>irony</u> as the <u>Apostles stay in Jerusalem</u> when persecution comes. Greek-speaking leaders go out. The great story of the inclusion of Gentiles is <u>Acts 10</u>: <u>Cornelius & Peter</u>. We see that <u>Peter never intended to go to foreigners</u>, till pushed by God's Spirit. He has to learn that <u>God shows no partiality</u>. God's <u>Spirit comes unexpectedly</u> and pushes him.
- But even <u>earlier</u>, Acts tells of <u>Philip</u>, a leader among Greek-speaking Jews. Under persecution he goes out to <u>Samaritans</u> alienated from Jews. <u>People respond</u> with joy. But surprisingly the <u>Spirit doesn't come</u>. There needs to be unity across old wounds and prejudices. The Spirit waits till apostles come from Jerusalem. Jews and Samaritans are united in Jesus.

Good News that Breaks Barriers — in a Single Person

- Acts pushes us to see <u>where God's work is going</u> by including the story of an <u>Ethiopian</u> <u>eunuch</u>. Dt. 23:1 rules that no eunuch can be part of God's people. But <u>Isa 56</u> held out great hope. The Spirit sends Philip to find <u>a particular person</u>, to show <u>God's intentions</u>.
- The event inserts the Good News into the ancient debate between exclusion and embrace. Was Israel an exclusive, pure community? Or could a foreigner like the Moabite Ruth be included?
- A different ethnic identity. A rejected sexual condition. A powerful part of a pagan court. But drawn to God enough to travel to Jerusalem to worship. Reading Isaiah 53: the "Suffering Servant"—with questions. Philip realizes from the Spirit that this man, on the other side of a whole series of barriers, can receive the good news of Jesus, be part of Israel's Messiah.
- The Ethiopian eunuch two words that <u>excluded</u> him sees the challenge of <u>God's servant</u> who dies for the deep sin, brokenness, and alienation of God's people and all others. Jesus turns indescribable <u>humiliation</u> into <u>Good News</u> that includes even him. "What's to stop me...?"

 The Greek-speaking <u>Jew</u> and the <u>Ethiopian</u> join in his <u>baptism</u> into <u>Jesus</u>. Joy breaks out.

Just How Far Does the Good News Go?

- <u>Paul</u> had been a <u>Pharisee</u>, bearers of the pure community, <u>exclusivist</u> side of the debate. But now he preached among <u>ethnic Gauls</u> living in Asia Minor, strangely tempted by exclusion.
- Because <u>God works in Jesus' faithfulness</u> in the <u>Gospel event</u>, <u>everything changes for everyone</u>. <u>Ethnic</u> barriers, <u>slave/free</u>, even <u>gender</u>, all fall as each becomes <u>part of God's life in Jesus</u>.
