The Generosity of Grace

2 Corinthians 8:1-15

We want you to know, brothers and sisters, **the grace** (*charis*) **of God** that has been granted among the assemblies of Macedonia; ² for in a **severe trial of affliction**, their **abundance of joy** and their **profound poverty** have overflowed in **the wealth of their simple generosity**.

³ For, as I can testify, it was according to their power, and even beyond their power, by their own choice, ⁴ with many pleas, begging us for **the grace** (*charis*) and the **fellowship** of this **ministry** for God's people. ⁵ This wasn't as we anticipated; rather, **they gave themselves first to the Lord** and, by the will of God, to us.

⁶ This led us to encourage Titus that just as he earlier made a start, so also he should bring **this grace** (*charis*) to **completion for you**. ⁷ What I mean is that just as you indeed **abound in everything** – in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in great eagerness, and in our love for you – that you also **abound in this grace** (*charis*).

⁸ I'm not saying this as a command, but I'm offering a way to test the **genuineness of your love** in relation to the earnestness of others.

⁹ For you know the grace (*charis*) of our Lord, Jesus the Anointed King, that for your sakes he became poor, though he was rich, so that you by his poverty may become rich.

¹⁰ So I'm just giving advice in this matter. This is **good for you**. Whoever last year made a start not just in simply **doing** something but also in **desiring it** – ¹¹ now finish the doing, so that your **readiness to desire** may be matched by completing it from what you have. ¹² For if the **readiness** shines through, one is well accepted according to whatever one has, not according to what one doesn't have.

¹³ Not that there should be relief for others and trouble for all of you, but some **fair balance** in the present – ¹⁴ **your abundance aiding their need**, in order that their abundance may be for your need, in order that there may be **a fair balance**. ¹⁵ As it is written,

"The one with much did not have too much, and the one with little did not have too little." [Exodus 16:18]

Acts 20:32-35 Paul talks to the elders of the church at Ephesus

³² And now I commend you to <u>God</u> and to the <u>message of his grace</u>, ³³ I coveted no one's silver or gold or clothing. ³⁴ You know for yourselves that I worked with my own hands to support myself and my companions. ³⁵ In all this I've given you an example that by such work we must support those who are vulnerable, remembering the <u>words of the Lord Jesus</u>, for he himself said,

'It's more blessed to give than to receive.'

Luke 12:32-34 Jesus teaches his disciples

³² "<u>Don't be afraid</u>, little flock, for your Father has joyfully decided to <u>give you the kingdom</u>. ³³ Sell your possessions and <u>give aid to others</u>. Make yourselves purses that don't wear out– a <u>treasure</u> in God's realms that never runs out, where no thief is near and no moth destroys. ³⁴ For where your treasure is, there <u>your heart</u> will be also."

Matthew 6:24 Jesus warns that his disciples can't serve money and possessions. ²⁴ No one can be a servant to <u>two lords</u>, for they'll either hate the one and love the other, or be devoted to the one and despise the other. <u>You can't serve both God and Mammon</u>.

John 3:16

¹⁶ "For <u>God loved the world</u> so much that <u>he gave his only Son</u>, in order that everyone who trusts in him would not perish but have <u>Life</u> of the age to come."

The Grace of God & Worship through Giving

- We began the <u>new year</u> hearing <u>Jesus</u>' teaching about serving <u>God</u> and <u>Mammon</u> and about being <u>anxious</u> about life. How can I live that in <u>a world organized around Mammon</u> and powered by anxious, competitive desire. <u>Serving Mammon is our default setting</u>.
- Each Sunday: "<u>Worship through Giving</u>." What does it mean? Offerings aren't mere tokens. They're a language of <u>gratitude</u>, spoken with <u>money</u> – the <u>stuff</u> we get in <u>exchange</u> for a portion of our <u>life</u>, <u>energy</u>, <u>creativity</u>. We all <u>pay life to get money</u>. It can become Mammon: <u>getting</u> money is fundamental. <u>Jesus</u> takes money very seriously: *"More blessed to <u>give</u>…"*
- Paul recognized the challenge of teaching Gentiles & Jews. <u>Traditional religion is often bargain</u> <u>and payment</u>. If God is good to me, I'll pay a vow. I'll give in order to get far more. Is God good, fair? Am I getting return for my faith, worship, gifts I bring? Doesn't God owe me?

God's Reality & A Revolution of Heart and Action

- As Paul taught in Macedonia and Greece, he was leading people to a "renewal of mind," a <u>revolution in vision, understanding, and practice</u>. He announced the <u>Good News</u> and called them to grasp the <u>Love</u> and <u>way of life</u> it embodied. <u>Nothing is earned</u>; <u>nothing is paid</u>. <u>Everything is given</u>! <u>God starts</u>! God gives himself, his love, his life in Jesus.
- Paul's <u>collection for poor Jews of Jerusalem</u> challenged Greek believers. Paul calls it <u>Grace</u>, but they faced affliction and poverty themselves because of their faith. Is God fair? Is he good? Yes! Their suffering forced them to face seriously the question, "<u>What really</u> <u>matters</u>?" "What is my life about?" "What really lasts?" They realized that the gift of God's Grace was what gave them "abundant joy." A joy and peace that can flourish and sustain in suffering. As <u>God had given himself to them</u>, they gave themselves to <u>God</u>. They experienced the love and grace at the heart of God and desired to give. Affliction and abundant joy and profound poverty led to generosity. <u>Embodied Grace</u>.

Practicing the Transformation of Grace

- Paul wants the Corinthians (and us, not in such desperate straits) to <u>experience the same</u> <u>embodied grace</u>. The inner revolution isn't separate from outer practice. It shines through.
 <u>Desire</u> / <u>readiness</u> to share resources. <u>Persistence</u> to really give, <u>completing</u> the action. Watching the action flow from giving ourselves to God to sharing love to each other.
- Thankful, seemingly <u>irrational generosity</u> helps <u>de-fang</u> the bite of Mammon. We choose to live below our means in order to be generous with our means. Jesus says "<u>Don't be afraid</u>!" The "abundant joy" that flows from Grace and shared life is true wealth – living out God's Grace & Love in our own life. They put their treasures in God's realm in generously serving each other and those far away. It worked. <u>God's own joy and grace bloomed in them</u>.
