# Confident Life in the Generosity of God

### 2 Corinthians 9:6-15

<sup>6</sup> The point is this: whoever **sows seed sparingly** will also **reap sparingly**, and whoever sows trusting God's **blessings** will also reap by those blessings –<sup>7</sup> each one, just as they've **decided in the heart**, not from grief or from compulsion, for "God loves a cheerful giver" [Prov 22:8-9 Gk].

<sup>8</sup> Now **God has power** to make **all grace** (*charis*) abound for you, so that having all **self-sufficiency** in all things at all times, you may **abound in every good work**. <sup>9</sup> As it is written, "They scattered freely, they **gave to the poor**; their righteousness endures into the age to come" [Psa 112:9].

<sup>10</sup> The one who "supplies seed to the sower and bread for food" [Isa 55:10] will supply and multiply your seed and make the produce of your righteousness grow, <sup>11</sup> as **you're enriched in everything to be simply generous in every way**. That will produce **thanksgiving** to God through us.

<sup>12</sup> For the ministry of this service is not only fully providing the things that God's people lack, it's also creating abundance through many expressions of **thanksgiving to God**. <sup>13</sup> They glorify God through the experience of this ministry when they see how **your confession leads you to yield to the Good News of the Anointed King**, and they see a **simple generosity** in your sharing with them and with all people, <sup>14</sup> All the while they care deeply for you and pray for you, because **God's astonishing grace** (*charis*) that he's giving you.

<sup>15</sup> Grace (charis) belongs to God for his inexpressible gift!

### Proverbs 22:8 Greek LXX

Those who sow useless things will reap bad things and they'll drive home the impact of their deeds. God blesses a person who's cheerful and giving.

#### Psalm 112:6-9

<sup>6</sup> The righteous ... <sup>7</sup> won't be afraid of evil news, since their heart is prepared to hope in the Lord. <sup>8</sup> Their heart is firm ... and unafraid .... <sup>9</sup> They scattered freely; they gave to the poor; their righteousness endures into the age to come ....

#### Isaiah 55:1-2, 10-11

<sup>1</sup> "Come, everyone who thirsts, come to the waters; and you who have no money, come, buy and eat! Come, buy wine and milk without money and without price. <sup>2</sup> Why do you spend your money for that which is not bread, and your labor for that which does not satisfy? Listen carefully to me, and eat what is good, and delight yourselves in rich food....

<sup>10</sup> For as the rain and the snow come down from heaven and do not return there but water the earth, making it bring forth and sprout, giving seed to the sower and bread for food, <sup>11</sup> so shall my word be that goes out from my mouth; it shall not return to me empty, but it shall accomplish that which I purpose, and shall succeed in the thing for which I sent it."

### Philippians 4:11-13

<sup>11</sup> Not that I'm speaking of being in need, for <u>I myself have learned in whatever situation I am to be self-sufficient</u>. <sup>12</sup> I know how to <u>be humbled</u>, and I know how <u>to abound</u>. In any and <u>every circumstance</u>, I have learned <u>the secret of facing plenty and hunger</u>, abundance and need. <sup>13</sup> I'm strong for all things in him who strengthens me.

### 2 Corinthians 8:3-5, 9 The Generosity of impoverished believers.

<sup>3</sup> For, as I can testify [about the Macedonian believers], it was <u>according to their power</u>, and even <u>beyond their power</u>, by their own choice, <sup>4</sup> with many pleas, begging us for <u>the grace</u> (*charis*) and the <u>fellowship</u> of this <u>ministry</u> for God's people. <sup>5</sup> This wasn't as we anticipated; rather, <u>they gave themselves first to the Lord</u> and, by the will of God, to us. ...

<sup>9</sup> For <u>you know the grace</u> (*charis*) of our <u>Lord</u>, <u>Jesus the Anointed King</u>, that <u>for your sakes</u> he <u>became poor</u>, though he was <u>rich</u>, so that <u>by his poverty you may become rich</u>.

### God's Choice of Generous Grace

- <u>Jesus</u> taught <u>farmers</u> and <u>fishermen</u> about <u>treasures</u> in God's realm, serving God and <u>Mammon</u>, and choosing <u>not to be anxious about life</u>. <u>Paul</u> gave us the example of <u>persecuted</u>, <u>impoverished believers</u> overflowing with <u>simple generosity</u>.
- It's hard to relate. We in the US are <u>well-off</u> in the world at large but most of us don't feel <u>rich enough to be generous</u>. We like generosity. Henry Ford or Bill Gates makes a pile of money, sets up a foundation, becomes "good," a benefactor. We learn generosity as a function of wealth. That's "love of honor" (a payoff) not <u>simple generosity</u>.
- The striking thing in the NT is <u>Generosity of the Poor</u>, not for any glory but to <u>learn God's</u> <u>grace</u> by simply seeing and helping the needs of others. There's no virtue in <u>poverty</u> nor any necessary evil in <u>wealth</u>, but there's <u>danger in both</u>. Dispair and rage, corrupt power, blindness to others, etc. All along the spectrum, we learn that Mammon saves.
- God's grace draws us to see <u>simple</u>, non-manipulative <u>generosity</u> as a core of life for everyone no matter what their circumstances. Seek to <u>share in the practice of Grace!</u>

## Meditating on God's Grace – Practicing God's Grace

- God, as we see him in Jesus, unites the limits of wealth/power and poverty/vulnerability. Paul calls us to think how Grace re-makes us as we live within it. Three scriptures. It challenges us to think clearly about reality, about just how much we receive: life, hope, forgiveness, God's Spirit, etc. All came by God joyfully taking on my vulnerability, poverty, death in Jesus. I'm like that lily, more beautiful than Solomon. Even persecuted and without money, I'm rich. I want to learn that joy and love of God that I see in Jesus. God's grace re-makes me as I make choices, find ways to practice God's love and joy in generous grace. No bargain, no payment, only gift: God's inexpressible Gift.
- This sort of re-make <u>can't be law</u>. We <u>see it</u> in Jesus; we <u>catch it</u> from others; we learn to <u>breathe it</u>. We find it bears our weight. It makes life joyful in any circumstances. Not pleasurable or without pain and suffering, but <u>joyful</u> in the high, wide, deep <u>love of God</u>.

# Do it, Do it, Do it!

- Paul is offering the Corinthian <u>one starter way to begin this remake</u>. People far away in need. Sacrifice without any real response except the creation of <u>thanksgiving</u>. Not the end but the <u>beginning of learning Grace</u>, but it is <u>a step on the journey</u> into God's life.
- <u>We seek out ways</u> in our own situations to <u>practice simple generosity</u>. No repayment except insight into God's joy. That's what <u>church ministries</u> are. Starter opportunities, ways to grow, places to learn what matters, God's grace, his inexpressible gift!
